

In all situations involving the sale, supply or consumption of liquor

Liquor is only consumed by persons over 18 years of age

Liquor is not supplied to a drunk person

A drunk person is not permitted to consume liquor on the function premises

Offence provisions

Despite being exempt from the Act, in many situations the venue/ premises are deemed to be regulated premises under section 122 of the Act.

This means that offence provisions apply if a juvenile or drunk person is sold, supplied or permitted to consume liquor on the premises and monetary penalties apply.

COMPLIMENTARY SUPPLY OF LIQUOR BY A BUSINESS

Supply of liquor is exempt from the requirements of the Act if :

- The liquor is supplied by a person who carries on a business, or by an employee, contractor, or agent of such person;
- The liquor is supplied to a customer of the business;
- The supply of the liquor is
 - ancillary to the business;
 - without charge;
 - takes place on the business premises
- The quantity of liquor supplied to the customer on those business premises on any one day is either
 - No more than two standard drinks for consumption on the business premises; or
 - No more than one litre for consumption off the business premises.

A Standard drink is defined as a drink not containing more than 10g of ethanol measured at 20C.
